SENSORY EXPLORATION AND ACTIVITIES FOR CHILDREN FROM THE LEVY OT-PT STAFF

All children need to actively participate in sensory exploration or activities throughout the day, every day. You may find that certain children seek out or avoid some activities which may show you what sensory processes they may need help in addressing. Observe children and read their cues carefully to determine which activities may be helpful—remember not all activities and modifications will work with all children.

There are three basic neurological systems which sensations of touch and movement come through: The vestibular, the proprioceptive, and the tactile system. Below you will find examples of activities that work on a child's sensory system in each area.

Vestibular:

Swings
Therapy ball
Rocking chair
Dancing to music
Bike
Scooters

Visual & Auditory:

Play relaxation music.
Turn off the lights and use
natural light
Christmas lights hung in room
Bubble tubes

Tactile:

Putty
Shaving cream
Bumpy balls
Fidgets
Play in rice or beans – only
with kids who won't put it in
their mouth.

Proprioceptive:

Putty or play dough

Tug-of-War

Animal Walks

Weighted items

Push weighted cart

Carry books or other heavy items

Wipe off tables

Take out the trash

Scooter board, especially on tummy

Push on scooter

Bear hugs

Lotion massages

Chew licorice or beef jerky

Drink regular yogurt through a straw

Blow bubbles or blow on a pinwheel



In October, we learned about a different habitat every week and the different animals that live there! Each week we created these different animals in diverse ways, such as, using newspaper for polar animals and using paper plates and sand for our desert animals. During the last week, we discussed fall celebrations and traditions, such as, trick or treating, going to the pumpkin patch, and the Day of the Dead. 

Classroom E9


E9 has had a fun and very productive year. We have had many new staff and students join our classroom throughout the year and we have become a "big family".


