Suicide

What you need to know!

If you are ever concerned about your child being suicidal, you can take your child to the Comcare Crisis Center at 635 N. Main. It is open 24 hours. A counselor will talk with you and your child. There is no cost. Please call 911 if you are concerned about another student who is suicidal.

Please call Kim Voth, 973-7264, if your child is dealing with depression or is hospitalized because of depression/suicidal issues - so we can help provide additional support at school.

LEADERSHIP/SUPPORT GROUPS

Your student may be selected to participate in a support group that meets weekly.

Higher Ground - "Challenge by Choice" is a support group for students who need some extra support and guidance. Topics include coping with stress, anger management, social skills, violence prevention, and drug education.

Brotherhood - David Gilkey meets weekly with two groups of boys. Activities include guest speakers, field trips, discussions about violence prevention, gang prevention, anger management, choices and consequences, drug education, and developing leadership skills.

Sisterhood - Lynn Gilkey meets weekly with two groups of girls. Activities include guest speakers, field trips, community service opportunities, building confidence, and developing leadership skills.

ACT Sign-Up

All Juniors need to take the ACT at least once this year. Many colleges have a November 1 scholarship priority deadline. Without an ACT score to report, students miss out on college scholarships!

How Do I Send My Final Transcript To My College?

After graduation, your transcript will be available to send to the college that you will be attending. All transcripts must be sent electronically through this website: https://www.parchment.com/u/registration/130651/account

Make a Parchment account, if you haven't already, and then request your transcript. You will need a debit or credit card to pay for the small service charge.

Do not email counselors or staff to send your final transcript. It must be sent electronically to the college that you designate.

EXTENDED SCHOOLYEAR

East will offer extended year to East students that score a 50% to 59% in the following courses:

- English 1
- English 2
- Algebra 1
- Geometry
- Biology
- Global Environment
- Earth Space Science
- Physical Science

The dates are the same as the district summer school, and students attend from 7:30 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. Once a student has brought their grade up to a passing score, they are finished—in the past students have worked from an extra 2 days to the entire 3 weeks.

Course Enrollment 2017 - 2018

Students have selected their classes for the 2017-2018 school year. Parents can call counselors towards the end of May to review their child's schedule. In July, when parents and students return for enrollment, that will be your last opportunity to discuss any changes that you want to make to your student's schedule. It is very important that you and your child come to enrollment. Students will not be able to make any schedule changes after the first day of school.

How-Tos for Graduation

How To Dress for Graduation (under the gown):

Men generally wear dark trousers and a dress shirt and tie under their gowns. Women usually wear a lightweight dress or a blouse and a skirt that is shorter than the gown so it does not hang below the robe.

How To Wear a Graduation Cap: The high school graduation cap is worn flat on the head, one point of the square facing forward (like a diamond).

How to wear the Graduation Tassel: Tassels are worn on the right side at the start of the graduation ceremony, and the flipped to the left when graduates receive their diplomas.

How To Wear Your Graduation Gown: High school graduation gowns should fall midway between the knee and ankle. They are worn over regular clothing, zipped up in the front.

Parents/Guardians Response to a Crisis at School

WHAT YOU CAN DO DURING A SCHOOL CRISIS

- 1. **Do not come to the school.** You may not be able to get into the school. You may put yourself in harm's way or you may interfere with the emergency response actions of the personnel at the school site.
- 2. Stay where you are. Listen for information and instructions. Information will be conveyed through ParentLink, Wichita Public Schools social media, the district's cable channel, through our website www.usd259.org, and local media.
- 3. You will be informed of where to go to be reunited with your child. The "Reunification Site" for your school is the place where you will be allowed to pick up your child. Please be patient and follow the

- instructions. Several precautionary measures will be in place to ensure the safe return of your child.
- 4. **Do not call the school or your child** if he or she has a cell phone. The circuits you are using may be essential for the emergency response.
- 5. School will resume as quickly as possible. It is true that "getting back to normal" is the most reassuring response for children and adults.
- After the crisis, talk with your child about the situation and listen to your child's fears and concerns. Share ongoing concerns with your child's teacher and/or a counselor.

How you will receive information in the EVENT OF A SCHOOL, DISTRICT, OR

COMMUNITY EMERGENCY:


- ParentLink automated calling system (sends both a phone message and e-mail message) from your child's school (if the emergency is an isolated incident).
- District and the school website and social media.
- Local Media
- * Not all of the emergency notification resources will be used for each situation. If you have questions about how you will receive notification in a particular situation, please contact your child's building.

NOTE:

It is important to keep in mind that all emergency notification is based on information in the district's student database. If your contact information changes during a school year, PLEASE notify your child's school of this change so records can be updated.


