## The Four-Quadrant Coordinate Plane

The intersection of a horizontal $x$-axis and vertical $y$-axis at a point called the origin divides an infinite flat plane into four quadrants.

## Language Arts News (Ms. Ficken)

We have wrapped up our Imagination Unit and are headed into an assessment review. We will take the next few weeks to revisit tested standards. Setting, tone and mood, along with figurative language are just a few of the literary elements we will review before spring break. After we return from spring break, we'll touch on plot and theme. Even though our new curriculum has this built into the units, it is always good to do a review and refresh our students' memories prior to testing. Then we'll head into our next unit which deals with exploration.

## Math News (Ms. Wysong)

In our current module, students are formally introduced to negative numbers. They focus on the meaning assigned to positive and negative rational numbers, with particular focus on the meaning in real-world and mathematical situations. Students develop an understanding of the relationship between opposites and distance on a number line, leading to the concept of absolute value. Students will then explore the four quadrant coordinate plane. After developing a strong foundation for plotting points and determining distances on the coordinate plane, students analyze and solve problems involving geometric shapes on the coordinate plane.

## Science News (Ms. Sears)

We have successfully wrapped up our Intro to Chemistry unit and are now diving into Ecology. So far in Science, we have completed photosynthesis and cellular respiration and have now gone into populations. Over the next week, we will be learning more about symbiosis. Symbiosis is the interactions between at least two living things that typically benefit from each other. The students will be taking a quiz on Thursday, March 12, 2020. This is a good stopping point for our unit and when they come back from Spring Break we will retouch on what we have learned this far and jump on into food webs and food chains. As a reminder, it is important for students to complete their work in a timely manner. If students are absent it is their responsibility to make sure they get and return the work they missed. Absences are not an excuse for not completing their work and getting it turned in. ## Social Studies News (Ms. Daniels)

Social Studies—Knowledge is POWER!!
After spring break we will begin our study of ancient Greece by looking at the Athenian and Spartan societies. This is a really fun unit and leads up to a big debate about which one would be the better society to be a part of. We will learn about the beginnings of democracy, where citizens have rights as well as responsibilities. Students will connect their learning to our current citizenship requirements which include, going to school. Yes, it comes as quite a surprise to students that they are required by law to attend school as part of their citizenship responsibilities.
