

I am so proud of the way that our students have been behaving! On Friday, January 5, I told your child just how proud of them I was during a grade-level assembly. I told students that fewer behavior incidents were referred to the office during quarter 2 compared to quarter 1. This means that less students are getting into trouble! The Sixth graders reduced their incident referrals by 1 and the eighth graders had 22 fewer.

When Pleasant Valley's behavior incident referrals go down, students generally feel more pride about their school and do better in their classes. I look forward to your child continually acting appropriately as we move through 2018 and the winter semester.

8th Grade Team

Eighth grade social studies: All 8th grade classes completed the district's DBQ before leaving for break. Seeing their growth in their abilities when writing a DBQ from fall to the one in the spring is always pleasant. We are now working on completing the National History Day projects for Academic Night on February 1. All students in the building are required to attend for their allotted time period (6:00-6:30 or 6:30-7:00) and present their projects to the community. The due date for student projects is January 12. We are gearing up to dig further into American History from the American Revolution through the Civil War. Teachers are really working hard to remind the students that they have only this semester left before they move on to high school, therefore they really need to be in class every day, attentive and ready to learn. This semester's grades will determine whether or not they are allowed to participate in fall extra-curricular activities in high school as a freshmen.

Language Arts with Mrs. Busch and Ms. Turner: The students are finishing up on their essays centering on *Conflict*. Writing prompt was: "Experiencing conflict in one's life has more advantages or disadvantages?" The unit focus for the month of January is Decisions. Students were notified that they will be taking a final in May. The students will be given a study guide and will be expected to study at home. Students will not be allowed access to their notes or textbooks during the final. Reminder the students have 2 book project due this 3rd quarter. Please ask to see your child's reading contract to see the books they should be reading and the due dates of each.

In 8th grade science: We are either wrapping up our physics unit by building roller coasters out of pipe insulation to learn about potential and kinetic energy or are beginning our environmental science units by investigating various natural resources.

Math:

Welcome back from break!!! We are still working hard on all the aspects of linear equations including slope. Please continue to do your homework. Homework is given Monday through Friday. Make sure your child is keeping all your work and notes!! At the end of the semester students will be taking a cumulative final. On January 23rd your child will be pre-enrolling in either North or Heights. The counselors will be coming to enroll students during math. Math teachers will be sending home information about elective classes with your child. Please take time and discuss option for classes with your child. If you have any questions or concerns about your child enrolling for 9th grade, please contact your child's teacher or the school.


